Entries will be judged by members of the Bletchley Writer's Society and a prize of £1 awarded for the best item in each of three age groups. (Prizes donated by the Women's Fellowship).

Results will be published in Issue Number 7 (May) and we reserve the right to publish all or part of any entry in that issue or subsequent ones. We ask all parents to encourage their children to enter this competition and help us make this a newsletter that looks forward as well as to the past.

THE SOULBURY ENDOWED SCHOOL CHARITY (formerly The Lovett and Sambee Charity)

Soulbury has a unique feature in its village history in that, in 1710, Robert Lovett (the Lovett family lived at Liscombe from the Norman Conquest up to less than 100 years ago) left £300 in his will 'for teaching 24 boys and girls and apprenticing one boy or boys'. There is a memorial tablet in the church chancel to the then vicar, the Rev. John Sambee, who was to administer the trust. He received the money in 1712 and in 1728 built Lovett Charity School (now Lovett House on Chapel Hill) and a schoolmaster was appointed. Much fascinating detailed history cannot be told here, but after the Education Act of 1947 the Charity took its present form under which sums of money are paid out annually to apprentices and students. Applications from would-be recipients, who must of course be residents of Soulbury parish, should be made for consideration at the start of the academic year in the autumn to Mr John Pargeter who is clerk to the trustees. The trustees are the vicar, the two churchwardens and two representatives nominated by the Local Authorities.
