A SUMMER HOLIDAY

For fifteen days in August Liz Miller will be joining a scientific research team in Iceland that is studying glaciers. 3M (UnitedKingdom) plc offer teachers the opportunity for a place on a variety of Earthwatch all of projects which are concerned with long-term environmental sustainability or endangered species. When Liz won the award she chose the most northerly project as she has before experienced extreme near-arctic conditions.

The team of ten will be camping at the foot of a glacier, five hours by 4 wheel drive vehicle from habitation, studying particularly the impact and predictability of a "jokulhlaup". One of theses occurred in 1996 and another in When volcanic activity 2001. takes place beneath the ice of a glacier much melting takes place. Rather than running progressively the melt water is often constrained by ice, rocks or the shape of the terrain, and bursts out after a few days in an enormous rush, sweeping all before it. If this happens in line with habitation devastation on a great scale ensues. In 1996 and 2001 the "jokulhlaups" took fairly safe routes luckily going northwards to the sea, damaging only bridges, roads and power lines on the way.

Liz will be working temperatures of around 0 degrees taking samples from glaciers and surveying landforms, having received training on site. Some scientists are working on the theory that the evidence of water on Mars show very similar scars to those produced by the effect of volcanic activity and ice melt. Two of the team of scientists are directly investigating this aspect.

On her return Liz is expected to give presentation to her school and feed back her experiences into the classroom. She should have time to recover from her chilblains first though.

THE WEDDING

Esther Martin from Chapel Hill Soulbury is currently working under the auspices of VSO, as a Safe Motherhood Trainer in Phnom Penh, Cambodia. Here is the first of two accounts, which illustrates some of the cultural differences she has encountered so far

Today there was a wedding in my street. The preparations started the day before. came and put poles and a green canvas covering up, it stretched all across the street from one house to another and for three houses on each side. Last night people decorated it all with bright blue and pink silky material. Tables and chairs in red and silver were set out in the road for the guests, the tables laid with fancy plates, spoons and chopsticks. Cans of beer for the men and soft drinks for the women - women are not allowed to drink beer on these occasions. only barangs (foreigners) can drink alcohol. On each end of the canvas covering and hug up each side, were big branches of bananas sprayed silver and gold, and decorated with swags of golden ribbon. One of the houses has a balcony, which was decorated with gold and pink material; two chairs were placed for the bride and groom.

Last night Khmer musicians came and played traditional music on strange wooden xylophones and traditional drums. This morning at 5.30am I was woken to very loud pop music. By about 7am many guests in their best clothes were queuing up with gifts in silver caskets. When I left home for work at 7.30 I could not get out and past with my bicycle, so had to leave it behind and hail a mota-taxi. The road was full of the guests eating soup, fried chicken, fish noodles and dumplings; they gave me strange looks as I passed by. Pech, my landlord, who was looking quite different in his best suit usually wearing only his kroma (shorts), apologised profusely. At the end of the street policemen were directing the traffic, but as police

everywhere do, making a mess of it all. When I came home at lunchtime guests were still arriving and eating, with pop music still very loud, until the festivities finished at about 5pm, when the men came and took down the awning.

All that was left after the men had gone was pink paper from the napkins in the road and the silver and gold bananas; I never did see the bride and groom.

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
