
SOULBURY NEWSLETTER

It was a very impressive service conducted by the Bishop of Oxford, the Right Rev. Richard Harries, to a full congregation with a lovely choir as well.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The November Council meeting opened with a very comprehensive dissertation from Mr. G Twiss on the Luton Airport proposed extension to Western Airspace.

The first set of proposals involved a new approach flight path over Leighton Buzzard but having received very strong opposition to this, the airport is suggesting a wider sweep further north and west which would bring planes over Drayton Parslow (where Mr Twiss is a parish councillor) and Soulbury. The planes would be about a mile high and would only use this flight path when the wind was in the east: roughly a quarter to a third of the time. Noise levels on these descents would be twice as great as they are now (as the planes would be half the height) continually traffic is and increasing.

The consultation document issued Western Airspace the Development Team contained an error, claiming the new path was shorter and therefore would save fuel, actually it is several miles longer. This undermines any confidence one might have felt that the Airport Authority "knows with the extra This. intrusive noise levels over a quiet implication, rural environment persuaded the Parish Council to endorse Drayton Parslow's letter to the consultation team.

When discussing the playground, the Chairman reported a request for a netball post to be set up. This was agreed and the Clerk was asked to get some quotes for the project.

On the northern end of the village green several of the metal posts placed to discourage motorists from driving across the grass have fallen into disrepair. It was agreed to replace them with wooden or concrete ones; rather fewer and smaller.

The problem of the fence between the Millennium Green and the car park at the side of Andrew's Close was again raised. As the fencing is in a dangerous condition the Council were anxious to get a decision from A.V.D.C. as to what they intend to do about it. Please ensure your children do not use this spot as a short cut into the Millennium Green.

The next council meeting will be on Monday 16th December.

MILLENIUM GREEN

Some people will have read in the local newspaper of the decision made by the Trustees of the Green to deliver a final warning letter to dog owners and dog walkers about not leaving dog excrement on the path and grass of the Millennium Green. The situation has not improved, in spite of notices, warnings and requests to dogwalkers to be responsible and pick up what their dogs leave behind. The Trustees have made this decision with great regret, but feel they have no alternative. If the situation still doesn't improve, after a final warning letter, the Green will be closed to dogs for a trial period of three months. The Trustees fully appreciate that this is very unfair on responsible dog walkers, but hope they will understand the Trust's dilemma and be patient.

There is a resident in the village whose granddaughter is blind, a victim of the terrible disease toxocariasis which is caused by the organism toxocara found in dog faeces. We cannot risk this happening to any one of our children.

So dog owners, PLEASE PICK UP THE EXCREMENT YOUR DOG LEAVES BEHIND.

There have been complaints from other users of the Green, people with children who no longer use the Green because of the excrement deposited on the paths and also from wheelchair users who get excrement on their hands from dirty wheels. This is totally unacceptable.

Many thanks to Mr. Alf Peacock who came to the last meeting of the Trust to show us his slides of the Green and how it has changed over the years.

The entrance gates to the Millennium Green have now been repaired, new hinges and bolts bought and fixed. Thanks are due to Liz and Dave Miller for doing this work and to Jon Shepherd for buying and fixing a padlock to prevent the gates being stolen as well as the hinges and bolts!

A TIMELY REMINDER FROM A VILLAGE RESIDENT

Remember with the dark nights upon us, items left on pavements and footpaths are potentially dangerous.

I fell over a micro scooter left propped up against a wall in Mount Pleasant near to the entrance to the garages - a pavement used by many residents of the village not just the residents of the road itself. I note that 48 hours later the item is still there!!!! There is also a problem with recycling bins left on pathways either left out on Wednesday nights or Thursday evenings after they have been emptied. appreciate it is not easy for householders to move their bins and recycle baskets before dark as many do not get home until after dark in any event. AVDC suggest that bins are put out at 6.30am but some folk do put them out on pavements Wednesday evenings where shadows cast from street lights make them impossible to find until tripping over them.

However I do not see any reason why items such as scooters, skateboards and the like NEED to be left on public highways.


