## PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

A recent application by 'On A Mission' coaches for change of use of an area of Hollingdon Depot to an Operating Centre, brought some critical comment from the Parish Council. If anyone else would like to object or comment, the Planning Reference Number is 2000/2862. was also noted that retrospective application Harley's Farm has been refused, so the enforcement of that order should now take place.

In County Councillor's Report Mrs Brenda Jennings remarked on the new structure of the Council and that everyone was at present still experimenting with it. She did however report that the Bypass is definitely moving along well and is now scheduled for January 2003!! We quote from Bill Chapple who said in an information sheet, "Up until today we only had an agreement in principle from the Government for this Bypass. We are now one step closer to final agreement for this scheme. should not be too long until Stoke Hammond, Soulbury and the gated road through to Wing will return back to its residents as opposed to cars. The Bypass will also make it easier for people to travel from the county town of Aylesbury to Milton Keynes." The total cost of the scheme is currently estimated at £40m, with contributions expected from Bedfordshire County Council and a developer.

#### Rural Problems



The Parish Council is much concerned that a safe place for local children to use their bikes is created as soon as possible. The completion of an application for grant money is a long and often frustrating process but Mrs Jackie Ridley is working on this and we hope in a years time something will be in place. In the meantime we are relying on local youngsters to be sensible, patient and restrict their activities to safe and socially acceptable areas.

#### Dog Excrement

There seems to be an increase in the incidents of owners not cleaning up after their dogs, in all areas of Soulbury. It has become unacceptable behaviour to let your dog foul anywhere other than your own garden or a country field. It is an offence in a public place and can lead to a serious fine.



The Parish Council will give out yellow bags to anyone who would like them, or owners can easily provide their own, the bin for the dog bags is on the entrance to the Millennium Green and is regularly emptied.

## Soulbury Sign

Anglia Water is being pressed to compensate for the damage done to the sign at the entrance to the village. Unfortunately this is holding up the much-needed repair.

#### Church Entrance

The Parish Council have stressed to the Highways Department the danger posed by the steep drop opposite the Churchyard gates. Pedestrians and car users would benefit from a rail along the top of the slope, which we hope the county will see fit to install. The next Parish Council meeting will be on Monday 19<sup>th</sup> February.



#### MILLENNIUM GREEN NEWS

The memorial plagues for the trees are ready to be installed. thought the relatives might like to be present when we install them, so, later on in the year, when it is a bit warmer! we plan to do this and plant the Millennium Yew tree at the same time. This little tree is only a few centimetres tall but is very special. It's a cutting from an ancient Yew in Hambledon, Surrey, some 1000-2000 years old. Conservation Foundation donated it and we think ours must be planted a favourable, eye-catching position, so that you can imagine what the Green might look like in another 1000 years!

Mr Bill Chappell from Stewkley has kindly donated a locally produced variety of plum tree, a Stewkley plum tree, which has been planted near the children's playground. It's very gratifying that we are helping to continue the cultivation of local trees and plants. We hope to install a water outlet and tap at the entrance to the Green to enable us to water young trees and hold public functions more

easily in the future. This will be done in the next few months.

Finally two reminders. Firstly dog excrement! The Millennium Green is a very popular place for dogwalkers, but could you please pick up what your dog leaves behind and put it in the bin provided (at the entrance) or dispose of it some other responsible way. Secondly, could parents remind children not to cycle on the new turf at the entrance to the Green. It is too soft and muddy at the moment to take bikes. One day (!) there may be a cycle track on the Mount Pleasant playground, because we are all aware that there is a real need for places for children of this age group to go.


