

OBITUARY FOR A SOULBURY GIRL

A large crowd of friends gathered at All Saints, Soulbury, last Friday (23rd) for the funeral of Sydney Barnes, who died on 13th June.

Sydney was born on 17th march, 1906 in her grandmother's cottage. which used to stand beside 'The Boot' pub. As a girl she attended the village Church of England Endowed School. Sydney's grandmother ran the village grocery and general store from a ground floor of the cottage, selling tobacco and the LBO amongst other things. Her Aunt Harriet ran a haberdashery department in another room. She met her husband, Fred, in the village when he made the daily milk deliveries for the local farm dairies, and they were married for 60 years. Sydney had an encyclopaedic memory for names of places and people and she would dictate a short history of Soulbury as she remembered it as a girl.

It seemed entirely appropriate, therefore, that the church bells were pealed both before and after her service (for the first time in nearly 60/70 years as far as anyone is aware), and so an act of thanksgiving for the life of a very special Soulbury lady was turned into joyous celebration, exactly as she would have wished.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Chairman, Alf Peacock reported on the outcome of the meeting of the Council with the County Council representative from the Highways department who came to discuss traffic calming measures. He felt there was a distinct possibility of a successful application for a 20mph speed limit. Our village roads with their twisting features, narrow blind bend at the northern end, a fast dangerous bend below the Church, and pedestrians crossing at the Church and the Cross Bucks Way footpath, all constitute a positive case for a slower speed limit.

This would be of little cost to the Parish; the main expense would be the legal fees for changing the speed limit - which would be borne by the County Council.

There are more dog waste bags now in the village. If anyone would like a supply please call at the Clubroom when it is open, or telephone 270545. The District Council have had problems with the contractors in charge of servicing the dog waste bins, and ours has suffered along with everywhere else. However, a new contractor will take over on July 1st so any problems should be sorted out.

The village bus shelter was a topic of concern. The roof tiles are in need of replacement, and graffiti is gradually building up on the inside. A group of youngsters might like to come forward and paint the inside as a service to the community during the summer holiday. How about it?

Talking of service to the community the Parish Council, through the newsletter, would like to thank Mrs Maureen Fountain for keeping the bus shelter so clean and pleasant. For several years now, unasked, she has regularly scrubbed and swept it out, quietly getting on with a none too pleasant task; which users have possibly not appreciated.

A number of us from the Church went over to the Bucks county show Ground at Weedon on Sunday 11th for this event, the biggest of the Millennium in Buckinghamshire and Milton Keynes. This was a unique day for people from all Churches (some 300 churches gave their support) to gather with friends and discover neighbours to possibilities for us all in this new millennium. The object was "to make it a day for everyone, young and old to journey together in the Way of Jesus Christ".

There was a wide ranging programme of events including a United Service of worship in the middle of the afternoon and in the evening many were attracted to Pentecost Praise led by Graham Kendrick one of the most popular modern day hymn writers.

We believe this is a valuable service to the community as we see a steady rise in demand each year. Your generosity will help us to provide this much needed service and all our callers will benefit directly from your help.




