

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

At the Annual Parish Meeting, the Chairman welcomed those parishioners who had made the effort to attend, and the comment was passed that the Council cannot be functioning too badly or there would have been more of the public present!

In his report Mr Alf Peacock praised the village groups who kept the community functioning, and socialising active. He pointed out that the war memorial would soon be restored as the names were disappearing, and that the exit onto the road from the church would be made safer. He also thanked the two villagers who regularly, unasked, kept the war memorial and the bus shelter tidy and clean. He welcomed the local policeman to the meeting, P.C. Brigginshaw.

P.C. Brigginshaw reported that the year's crimes totalled 25 in Soulbury, a slight decrease in burglaries, but an increase in car related crimes. This was put down to the lack of cars being parked and left vulnerable by walkers in the countryside, so the criminals had turned to villages to find their victims. He recommended that all items of value were removed from cars, even for overnight parking.

Another situation he wanted us all to be aware of was the calling at the door of youngsters. One asked for a piece of paper and a pen to leave a message for an aunt, living nearby. Whilst the house owner went to fetch these, another had slipped into the premises.

The one on the door was very convincing and the thief just let himself out at the back. P.C. Brigginshaw thought it most likely

that these two villains would call on someone in Soulbury or nearby.

The police were also keen to see a few more Neighbourhood Watch coordinators working in Soulbury, to help keep the whole village covered. Both the County Councillor Mrs Brenda Jennings and the District Councillor Mrs Maureen Payne, made comment in their reports on the new system of working in the councils. Cabinet structure with Scrutiny Committees and Policy Advisory Groups, where specific responsibilities were allocated to individuals, all meant that there was a certain amount of learning and trying out to be done. Problems however were rapidly being ironed out and progress made towards modernisation.

Councillor Jennings reported that many footpaths should be opened in a restricted way by the end of May, and that the 20 mph speed limit was still being pursued for Soulbury. The work towards the by-pass was going on a pace, and the Wing by-pass had now been moved to the top of the list for consideration as the county recognised that the Milton Keynes – Aylesbury link was now top priority for the county.

Other business of the meeting recorded more complaints about the state of Hollingdon Lane, and the council agreed to order a load of topsoil for the children's playground to level the areas which had become eroded.

Councillor Miller reported a lack of progress on finding the owner of the Soulbury Fountain, this being a requirement of the grant application.

The meeting closed with a vote of thanks to the Council from the two

villagers present - Mrs Hilary Pooley and Miss Daphne Booth.

THE BOOT

30th April marked the end of an era in Soulbury. It was the last day for Tony Saint as landlord of the Boot for close on fifteen years.

Tony has spent a lifetime in the hotel and catering industry and was at Claridges and the Ritz in his early years as well as National Service in the same field as a commissioned officer. Subsequently he worked for Benskins and Ind Coope before retiring for the first time in 1976.

He and Lady Rose, whom he married thirty six years ago then embarked on a series of ventures in public houses with good restaurant potential where they could exercise their catering skills. First was the Cross Keys in Leighton, then the Carpenters Arms at Stewkley (1978-1982) followed by the Bugle Horn at Stone, the Wine Bar on the Market Square at Aylesbury and the Boot. They also took on for a time the Bernard Arms at Great Kimble and the Old Swan at Cheddington. Some of these were simultaneous but recently their sole interest has been The Boot.

On 22nd April staff and customers gathered at The Boot for a party to mark Tony's retirement (for the second time, it may not be the last).

Paul Mardlin presented Tony and Lady Rose with a substantial gift of garden vouchers as the main gift from customers and staff and there was a beautiful bouquet of flowers for Lady Rose. There were also many other individual gifts from appreciative customers.

Greg Nicholl, energetic managing Director of the Nicholls chain of brasseries took over The Boot at the beginning of May and we welcome Amber as the manager. The establishment closed on Sunday 13th for a sympathetic refurbishment over the next three weeks and is due to re-open at 11 a.m. on Monday 4th June.

It is understood that The Boot will stand outside the Nicholls chain and Greg is keen to quash any rumours that The Boot may be turned into a brasserie. Old faces will still be there behind the bar and in the kitchen.

Greg says he loves the country pubculture and is keen to retain it at The Boot where, following the success of the brasseries he will be able to realise a long held ambition without creating a brasserie or introducing brasserie menus.

The refurbishment is largely restoration but there will be a considerable investment behind the scenes in the kitchen and cold store facilities and a modern smoke extraction system.

Greg Nicholl is an enthusiastic chef. In the 80's he was head chef at the Swan in Leighton Buzzard then moved to Hatton Court in Hanslope near Milton Keynes as General Manager before setting up the first Nicholls Brasserie at Woburn which has now extended to include branches at Bedford, St Albans, Berkhamsted and Harpenden. He is passionate about supporting local suppliers who rear livestock humanely and grow their produce organically.

We wish Greg and his staff every success in his venture and trust that The Boot will not lose its character.


