A DISAPPEARING SPECIES

Have you seen one of these little creatures recently? If so, I would very much like to hear from you.

I am at present conducting a survey into the possible existence of water voles in the waterways of Soulbury Parish. Many people who were about in the countryside 25 years ago would be familiar with the sight of a nose moving along the edge of the water leaving a 'V' shaped wake or the noise of a 'plop' as the vole dived into the water.

But sadly the likelihood is that the water vole or Ratty from 'Wind in the Willows' will be extinct in a few years as his habitat is severely threatened and mink will attack and kill the remaining few. Jon Sheppard and I have been looking for colonies in the rivers and canals locally.

Small streams - provided they do not drop to less than about 6" of water may still support a small vole population.

Adults are about 20cm (8") from the nose to the base of the tail. They have a shaggy brown-black coat, a blunt nose, and short ears and tail (which is furry). They live near water, favouring steep riverbanks in which they make burrows. They prefer sites where the vegetation is tall enough to provide cover, but not overgrown with trees.

Their diet consists mainly of grasses and wetland plants. They breed between March and October, and each pair needs a territory of about 40 metres of riverside. If we can find any positive signs I will try to improve their chances of survival by increasing the food supply and cover, and introducing mink control with the co-operation of the landowner. So far, we have not found any really positive evidence but we are still hopeful, as several waterways in the vicinity look potentially attractive as habitat for water voles.

This is the second part of my project, which started with my trip to Belize to study manatees, and I am now working for endangered species locally. Earthwatch, a worldwide charity committed to conserving endangered species, sponsored my Caribbean experience and are also supporting this research. Over the next months we should complete the local survey, so if anyone has any information or sightings do please get in touch. Many thanks,

## PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

At the recent meeting discussions covered the topics of the replacement flag in the churchyard, the payment of the water bill for the allotments, planning applications, the children's playground in Mount Pleasant, grass cutting, street lighting in Manor Close and the Jubilee celebrations for next year.

County Cllr Brenda Jennings gave a short report about matters

affecting Soulbury and the surrounding area. Work is set to begin on the bypass next year, but not until August 2002. Everything seems to be going to plan and we can only hope and pray that the troubles Railtrack have experienced lately will not affect the building of our bypass, especially the bridge over the railway.

There was much discussion on the safety aspects of the playground. A bit of doom and gloom was expressed about the amount of money needed to upgrade the equipment to the high standards now required by new regulations. It was decided to arrange a special meeting to discuss the playground alone, since there seemed to be so many problems.

The Parish strimmer, which has a great deal of hard wear, had recently caught fire and the spare parts needed to repair it would be prohibitively expensive, so it has been decided to look into the cost of buying a new machine. Cllr Maurice Cross has already obtained some information on new strimmers and brush cutters and was prepared to carry on looking for the most suitable machine to buy.

District Cllr Mrs Maureen Payne informed the meeting that the Parish Forum this year will be on 29<sup>th</sup> October at Wingrave at 6.40pm for 7pm. This forum gives parish and district councillors a chance to meet one another and voice opinions.

The next Parish Council meeting will be on 19<sup>th</sup> November.

## JUBILEE CELEBRATIONS

The meeting took place on 17th October to analyse the results of the village questionnaires and to proceed with organising events. The questions about ways of covering the costs of the days of celebrations brought a mixed response but most people felt some fund raising before the event should take place. A bumper village raffle was proposed with a good variety of prizes, and the

possibility of the Parish Council assisting with this. The raffle would be drawn around Easter. which would give plenty of opportunity for offers of prizes!! and for selling tickets. Further events might be a Carol sing-along concert, and a race night, avoiding clashes with other village groups who also need to fund raise. Several villagers said they would prefer to give a sum of money so that no other money raising would be required. There was still some hope of a grant towards the celebrations, but the group felt that they should not rely on this. The group would like to hear of more willing helpers, and also information on children in the households. It was also decided that the evening barn dance and pig roast should be tickets only, with a cost of around £7.50 per person. Possibly on one of the afternoons some stalls could be set up for selling goods, probably before the street party which it was felt would be best held in the marquee for safety reasons. This would be another way of covering the costs of the two days and souvenir gifts to villagers, and any profits could be shared between the village organisations.

The next Jubilee meeting will be 3<sup>rd</sup> December in the clubroom. Do come along, even if you haven't been before, if you feel you can contribute something.

#### MILLENNIUM GREEN NEWS

There is not much to report on the Millennium Green this month. The swales, pond and ditch have all filled up with rainwater again. Another grass snake was seen crossing the main asphalt path at the weekend of 13<sup>th</sup> October - grass snakes not to be mistaken for adders, which have a dark, black mostly zigzag pattern down

the length of the body whereas grass snakes are a uniform dark brown/grey with a diagnostic yellow patch V-shaped on the back of the head and are usually much bigger.

There is some interesting news about a plum tree called the Aylesbury Prune. Liz Miller has found a source of this tree, which the trustees would like to put in the orchard. A Mr Hawkins from Pitstone has an orchard with Aylesbury Prune trees in. He has very kindly offered to give us a cutting or whip from one of his trees so that one day someone will be able to make some plum jam (said to be very tasty) from this neglected local tree, which we would like to help conserve on Soulbury Millennium Green.

I understand it thrives on the gault clay soil in the Aylesbury Vale area, (as gardeners here, you will know that wretched heavy soil you spend years trying to break down and improve!) - especially in villages the of Pitstone. Edlesborough, Northall and others. This tree likes clay soil! It's a late ripener, October time, with a dark blue-black plum, quite sharp in taste, good for jam.


