PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Last month local residents had raised some matters which concerned them to the Parish Council and the clerk was able to report that Hollingdon Lane, including the Clack section would be repaired and improved once Anglia Water had finished their work. Also the Stewkley Road verge should be a matter of priority within the County Authorities mowing scheme, and action would be taken there. The Parish Council had some marked success in changing the system concerning the consultation process on the erection of Communication Towers. Central Government had altered the time scale involved so that it would now give local communities a chance to comment before any masts of over 15 feet were installed.

The County Council announced that Castle Hill Bridge would be strengthened and repaired during the months of October or November, and the weight limit lifted. The road may well be closed for three nights during the operations. This was another successful campaign in which the Parish Council had put pressure on the authorities to alleviate the heavy traffic through the village sooner than it would have done otherwise.

We have received the information that Bucks County Councils Environmental Services have moved their Area Office for Aylesbury Vale to the Winslow Center. Functions dealt with directly from this office include: Highway Maintenance, Rights of Way, Traffic Management & Road Safety. There is usually a member of staff available to take your call or to direct your inquiry to the appropriate section in County Hall.

The Chairman agreed to represent Soulbury at the next Road Safety meeting and start the preliminary proceedings towards reducing the local speed limit to 20 MPH. Local traffic authorities have now been given the powers to permit the installation of this speed limit if the authority feels it is appropriate.

The Clerk reported that the street lamp, which was demolished by a car along the High Road outside Laburnham Cottages, should be repaired shortly.

We are also looking for wild flower seeds. It would be fun, when you're out for a walk, to collect poppy heads, clover or knapweed and wildflower seeds to scatter on the meadow.


