The audience was clearly engaged as there followed a lively question and answer session. To give a talk with such passion and emotion whilst knowing your topic so thoroughly is a gift itself. An auction was held for a print of Michael's Father's plane, moments before it was shot down which sold extremely well and in fact a second print was offered successfully to the underbidder. PARISH COUNCIL NEWS:

The Parish Council met on 19th September and the meeting was well attended by over 20 parishioners. After the minutes of the last meeting were approved we were addressed by Paula Boston, our local PCSO. She told us that since January the parish had suffered 8 burglaries (4 attempted and 4 actual) and 1 motor theft. This is pretty much on a par with surrounding villages. Her comment to us was that Soulbury does not report any strange or unusual occurrences. So if you see or hear anything out of the ordinary or that strikes you as odd, do please report it. You never know it may prevent a crime and a trauma to one of your neighbours. Another warning, or piece of advice was to be more vigilant at this time of year, particularly as the nights draw in. If you're going out leave a light on and perhaps a radio. If you live in a remote location consider CCTV. This can be a good deterrent or provide crucial evidence in the event of a felony.

Two planning applications were considered, one being accepted and one rejected.

Comments were raised about AVDC's lack of information when it comes to notifying us of decisions. Councillor Neil Blake then informed us that the system at AVDC was changing and the receptionist at the Planning department is to be a trained person and will be a single point of contact, who will know what they are talking about and be able to direct your call to the right person. Bucks County Council have debated and proposed the possibility of there being one new unitary authority, but there are those who consider that the county is too big geographically for this system to work. The debate goes on. Moving on, it was announced that the High Speed broadband was rolling out now to include 10 villages within the vale. We also heard that fibre optic cable is being blown up to the new occupiers of a unit in Hollingdon Depot, so watch this space. As far as future plans are concerned we learned that the Vale has a target of 28000 houses over the next 20 years.

Public participation produced some lively comments. Residents of Andrews Close are concerned about the amount of light they are losing through the growth of the maple trees on the green. It was agreed they could be removed, so we need to speak to the planning department or the tree officer before we can proceed to remove them. The street lights around Andrews Close are being fixed too. Another resident of the close has urged all residents to check their water bills!! After watching Rip Off Britain, he discovered he has been charged for drainage of surface water by Anglian Water and yet his surface water goes to a soak away, nothing to do with Anglian so he has had a refund. The message is to check your bill!! Any Other Business brought to light a complaint about horse riders using the footpath across the Green from Dean Farm Lane to Stewkley Road. Please don't do it!! Thank you.

W.I. NEWS: Our president, Jean Housley, welcomed members to our September meeting, after our summer break. As there was no meeting in August, a considerable amount of correspondence had built up which was dealt with along with the business. It was agreed that the barbecue held in August at the home of Gay Henrick had been a great success. The weather was kind to us and a most enjoyable time was had by everyone. The event resulted in a boost to our funds and grateful thanks was extended to Gaye and everyone else who assisted with preparing and serving the food. It was then time for our speaker, and members were transported back to their childhood as Peter Barrett relayed the origins of the Punch and Judy show! The first recorded appearance in England was in 1622 when Samuel Pepys observed an early version of the show by an Italian puppeteer in Covent Garden. The show was originally aimed at an adult audience but over the years became adapted for children. We learnt that the puppeteer is known as a "professor" and originally was assisted by a "bottler" who collected the money, but his role has now died out. Peter was inspired to become a Punch and Judy man by a chance broadcast by Robert Peston who was inviting people to try using the "swazzle", a device used to reproduce the unique voice of Mr Punch. We were then treated to a shortened Punch and Judy show, with members participating by calling out warnings and well remembered responses to the puppets. Peter was thanked for producing a most entertaining evening, by Jean Housley, after which refreshments were served. Our next meeting is on Tuesday 11th October when our speaker will be Charlotte White who will show us some Gift Wrapping Techniques.

Part 2 will be held one week later on Sunday October 30th during the afternoon, when the lights will be rigged for the Autumn Players' production 'Are You Being Served' Participants will get hands-on experience of hanging the lights and programming the lighting desk for the play.

Part 3 will be held towards the end of the year, and details will be available later. It is possible to participate in any or all of the three sessions.
