

Church News - Philip's message

Dear friends,

Memory is such an important faculty although it, of course, has it's up and down sides.

Memories of special places, loved people, pets, great concerts, favourite meals and so much more can truly enrich our lives. And, of course, the older we get the greater our store of memories is and possibly the greater benefit we gain from them. Not all memories, however, are pleasant and nurturing or good for our well-being: early traumas also stick with us and can make us vulnerable on occasion. I remember being rescued from a burning flat in Portsmouth when I was barely two year's old and being pulled out of the sea at Brighton at six year's of age. The rest of my childhood was pretty quiet I'm glad to say!

This month we have a very special remembrance: one hundred years since the end of WWI. A war which was supposed to last four months in the end lasted four and a quarter years, with the most appalling slaughter in Europe and the Middle East on no less than a dozen separate fronts.

We meet this year in thousands of communities worldwide to celebrate the end of hostilities - if only it could have been truly 'the war to end all wars'. Remembrance is a particularly important word/concept within Christianity, especially remembering through what Jesus has given us in the Eucharist, the Holy Communion. A powerful and moving memory of what He has done for us on the cross at Calvary - dying and rising for love of the whole of creation.

As you maybe, take some time this November to remember those who have given their all.



Parish Council News

The meeting of the Parish Council took place on 15th October 2018. There were 6 members of the public present. Apologies received from Cllrs Ian Culley and Janet Blake. Minutes of Parish Council previous meeting were approved. No matters arising.

Various accounts were paid.

Planning:

There were no planning applications for consideration. There are appeals for the Boot Field, Indoor school at Hollingdon Grange and Soulbury Ground Farm. Green Farm has been dismissed but an appeal will be made as further documentation regarding intentions is required.

Inspector wants to see more housing in the Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan (VALP) in the Expressway corridor.

Childrens playground: No parking sign to be put on gates as grass cutting was not possible again. Looking at putting a white line to highlight that access needed at all times.

Grass cutting: One more cut this year to set up for winter. Church yard needs to be right for Remembrance Sunday.

District Councillors: Cllr Neil Blake was present. Highlighted that Bucks County Council consultation closes 13 December for Early Help Review. Opinions to be made online. Local Area Forum discussed and Cllr Blake will get the dates for the next meeting to the Chairman and Parish Clerk.

Parish Hall: Cllr Stevens has installed a new fire door. Guttering is leaking - just needs clearing.

Soulbury Millennium Green: Clearing work continuing in the annex. Stan Morris memorial bench to be sited next weekend. Suggestion put forward to acquire adult exercise equipment using 106 monies. Will be discussed in depth at the next SMG Management meeting.

Public participation: Concern raised about Gt Brickhill's letter to their residents about boundary changes. They want all of Stockgrove, Bragenham and area going to the A5. As the letter only went to Gt Brickhill it was decided that this was most undemocratic and a note will go to Peter Brown highlighting this fact.

Residents of Laburnham Cottages, who purchased the mirror and pole, to aid getting into traffic in the High Road, would like to thank Cllrs Wright and Stevens for erecting same.

Any other business: 3 outstanding LED light conversions left to do. Food and logistics for the Battle is Over event were discussed. Paint stripper no effect on finger sign post. Other methods of refurb are being looked at. Really need a mobile sand blaster. The office of the Police and Crime Commissioner are recruiting volunteers to join its Independent Custody Visiting Scheme in Aylesbury. Editor's Note

This month I include the note which relates to the GDPR legislation and its connection with the Soulbury Millennium Green's 100 Club. Renewal of membership is due in the new year so application forms will be printed which we ask you to sign. Your signature is, as usual, acceptance of the rules of the club but will also assume you have read the content of this note.

Other clubs and society's in the village will have done or will be doing something similar to ensure they also comply with the legislation.



You will have heard about the Government directive - General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) which states that all clubs, societies, etc. have to get all their members to sign to say they are willing for their club or society to contact them. Obviously the clubs and societies already have all contact information given when members joined. However, it is now necessary to get specific permission from the individual member to allow us to contact them and to assure members that their personal information is safely stored. It appears that failure to comply with this directive could result in a hefty fine for the club.

Therefore, the Soulbury Millennium Green Management Committee will strive to meet the following six principles:

- Personal data will be processed lawfully, fairly and in a transparent manner.
- Personal data will only be collected for 'specified, explicit and legitimate purposes'.
- Data collected will be adequate, relevant and limited to what is necessary in relation to the purpose for which they are processed.
- · Personal data will be accurate and, where necessary, kept up to date.
- · Personal data which is no longer required will be deleted.
- Soulbury Millennium Green Management Committee will ensure all personal data they hold is secure.

Signature on application forms will, as usual, be acceptance of any club rules but will also assume you have read the above and are happy for us to contact you with matters relating to that club.



Theft from motor vehicles, particularly vans, is still very prevalent. Below is some advice which might go some way to preventing you becoming a victim.

How to keep you vehicles save and sound

- I. Always lock it.
- 2. Close windows and the sun roof to prevent 'fishing'.
- 3. Secure your number plates with tamper-resistant screws.
- 4. Fit locking, anti-tamper wheel nuts to secure alloy wheels.
- 5. Secure anything that's on the outside of your vehicle.
- 6. Take personal belongings with you.
- 7. Hide electrical items and leave no clues.
- 8. Take your documents with you.
- 9. Park in well-lit and busier areas.
- 10. Choose your car park wisely.

Equipment and tool security

- 1. Lock equipment away in a secure building or part of a building when not in use.
- 2. Invest in a secure storage toolbox.
- 3. Install a burglar alarm on buildings where equipment is kept.
- 4. Always lock vehicles when left outside and keep the keys in your possession.
- 5. Keep expensive items and vehicles out of sight when not in use.
- 6. Consider using hitch locks, wheel clamps or ground anchors.
- 7. Mark your tools and equipment, and register them for free with Immobilise.
- 8. Keep a record of all valuable items.

The office of the Police and Crime Commissioner is seeking volunteers to join its Independent Custody Visiting Scheme in Aylesbury. An Independent Custody Visitor (ICV) is a role performed by volunteers from the local community checking on the welfare and treatment of those being held in police custody. ICVs make unannounced visits to police stations to observe the conditions in which people are being held and, importantly, talk with detainees who are willing to chat.
