Soulbury Millennium Green News – April Report

April's meeting of the Soulbury Millennium Green Committee reported that this year's first event on the SMG had proved highly successful despite adverse ground conditions. Our **Easter Egg Hunt held on Saturday 30**th **March** was very well attended by local families with 16 children participating in the treasure hunt. The weather remained dry on the day, despite it having rained incessantly in the preceding days. Despite the event being organised as a community event, we managed to make an incredible £92.49 through voluntary donations and tea, coffee, hot chocolate & cake sales. Thanks to all who supported on the day, attending, helping erect & dismantle the fold out small marquee, baking cakes and manning the event.

The Soulfest Planning Sub Committee continue advancing plans and preparations for Soulfest 2024 planned for Saturday 22nd June commencing at 1:00 pm. Six bands & singers have now been booked and together with three DJ's, will entertain us throughout the afternoon and evening with a wide range of music genres catering for all tastes. Adult ticket price has now been set at £8.00 each with child admittance free. The event will provide a licenced mobile bar, "Matilda" - mobile coffee van (House of Coffee), barbecue food, Salad bar. Sadly the hoped Baked Potato food proposed earlier has now had to be dropped. Children's bungee trampoline entertainment is also expected to be available, similarly as at the last Fireworks Display night. A children's bouncy castle is also being explored by the Planning Committee. A letter from our Team Rector

This is a poignant article for me to write because it is the last article I shall write for our eight village newsletters. During May, my wife and I move to Derbyshire where I shall take up a new post in the church. Although it is fewer churches, it is significantly more people and a combination of rural, urban, estate and schools ministry.

That combination and the breadth of ministry across the Benefice here is the reminder that "church" is not a case of one size fits all; but it is also a salutary reminder that church is equally valid from the formal to the informal. That means that engaging with the various ways of being church is a worthwhile exercise because, who knows, one might suddenly hear, encounter, the same message in a "language" we were not expecting.

Fifty days after Easter takes us to the Feast of Pentecost. That's when the disciples were proclaiming the Gospel and the several nationalities assembled in Jerusalem each heard in their own native language. The account is recorded in the book of Acts. All spoken languages, it is true, but the lesson of Pentecost is that "church" can adopt several and various languages, ways of expression, when it comes to proclaiming the Gospel. Hence, the various service styles in our Benefice from the Book of Common Prayer, Common Worship, Breakfast Church, Messy Church and Brunch Church. And not to forget the services along the theme of Morning Prayer.

From my vicar days in Norfolk, I remember being greatly heartened by a group of octogenarians enjoying Mattins from the Book of Common Prayer who the week before, had readily taken up percussion instruments to accompany the worship band at Café Church. As the Benefice enters the time to discern a new Team Rector, I encourage you to continue to engage with church and perhaps, (maybe?) go to something very different to your usual choice – and not necessarily in your home church.

Finally however, my very best wishes for the life of your several and varied village communities and to thank you for the time we have had here.

Parish Council News

Parish Council News The meeting of Soulbury Parish Council was held on Monday 15th April 2024 at 7.30pm in the Parish Hall. There were 7 members of the public present. Apologies were received from Cllrs Maurice Cross and Jilly Jordan. Minutes of meeting on 18 March 2024 were agreed as correct. Matters arising: none. All monies paid and received noted by all and Cllr Wright signed the March bank statement.

Finance: Clerk has balanced the accounts and the books are now with the internal auditor. 50% of the precept (£12,500) and the annual Wayleafe (£33.01) have been received.

Planning: 24/01087: Fields to east of Soulbury Road, north of Soulbury Road, Farm, Wing, - removal of 255m section of hedgerow. Council wanted a note added to the application that there should be no hedgerow removal between 1 March and 1 September due to nesting birds as farmers and landowners have to abide by this regulation.

24/00819: Durrance Farm, Stewkley Road, Soulbury, LU7 0UU - installation of 372 ground mounted solar PV panels. Council has no objection.

Fountain: Plan with measurements needs to be drawn up. Cllr Wrright and clerk agreed to do this.

Allotments: Area still very wet. Gate from house to allotment site still needs to be closed off. Cllrs Wright and Kemal will organise this in the next week or so.

Lighting on corner of Stewkley Road and High Road: New streetlight in place.

County Councillor: Cllr Jordan sent her monthly report for inclusion on the parish website.

Millennium Green: Successful Easter Egg Hunt, £92.49 made and well supported. Soulfest planning going well. Parking area - plainings laid and compressing needs doing with roller/wacker plate. Need to decide on top dressing.

Correspondence: Biodiversity duty: clerk read salient points to those present. It was agreed that we already do a lot of what is required - it is just not documented. Clerk will produce a document based on the template supplied by next meeting. Clerk has the document should anyone want to read it in detail.

Councillors Open Forum: Cllr Stevens raised the issue that we all had been sent the polling card for PCC elections with no information about the candidates. A MOP felt the same so searched the internet and got details. Post meeting note: the Clerk obtained the link to relavant information and posted it on the Community Hub.

Public Participation: MOP wanted an update on work at Green Farm: track is being reinstated to give access to new barn for which planning permission has been received. The owner did point out that she has been working with ecologists and the like regarding this work, and has a good knowledge of her land, which results in no interference with wild life and protected


species. Another planning application will be made for dealing with the old house to remedy the eyesore prevailing at the moment.

It was suggested that the path on the Millennium Green be extended to make a circuitous route. s106 monies could be considered. There are other major projects there that could also use s106 monies so the SMG committee need to assess priorities.

MOP asked what was happening re trees planted by Bucks Council along High Road towards the Soulbury Road junction. He feels the trees opposite the junction should be removed as they will eventually get too big and will prevent the area being mown as mowers will not get between the hedge and said trees. Cllr Jordan has already been made aware of our feelings and needs so will chase her about this.

A MOP asked when the goal mouths will be rolled on the childrens play area. It was explained that we have several rolling jobs that need attention and we are in discussion with a person to do it. However, whilst the ground appears to be drying it is still too wet but a watching brief is being kept to get the job done. Bucks Spring Clean: Very successful litter pick was arranged. The Annual Parish Council meeting will take place on 20th May 2024 at 7:00pm in the Parish Hall.

Soulbury WI – April 2024 update

The meeting opened with the singing of Jerusalem and club business were discussed.

We then welcomed Dave Sivers- a local crime fiction author whose books include the popular Archer and Baines novels and the DI Nathan Quarrel series some of which have featured in National Crime fiction ranking tables. Dave was born and raised in West London, but now lives in Buckinghamshire, where many of the books are set. He started by explaining the journey to becoming an author from his mother's early influence and encouragement through the process of seeking inspiration [often in the most unlikely places] gathering of facts [from various professional bodies] and onto to actually writing a book and getting the cover designed through to finally getting it published. This is now made all the easier with modern technology and the ease of e-communication. His books are published via Kindle and also the process of 'print-on-demand' which means that an author no longer has to have hundreds of books languishing in boxes in a warehouse. When a customer orders a book is simply printed by the relevant self-publishing platform and sent to them. This was an amazing talk giving a great insight to everything that happens before we actually pick up a book and read it!

Dave currently has had 9 Titles published some of which he brought along to sell at a reduced price to our members.

We then enjoyed tea and biscuits and drew the raffle before the meeting closed at 4:30pm.

The next meeting is on 14th May at 2pm, which is a Resolution meeting.

A resolution is a call for change on a current issue in society. Once a resolution has been adopted at the Annual Meeting, the Public Affairs Department turns it into a campaign. Through national and local campaigning, members play a key role in achieving change on important issues. This years short-list was:-

- Dental Health Matters
- Impacts of Poor Housing Conditions
- Say 'No' to Gambling Advertising
- Improve Outcomes for Women in the Criminal Justice System

Over 95,000 individual selections were cast by WI members and the most popular resolution was Dental Health Matters which attracted 37,772 votes [39.6% of the votes cast]

Dental Health Matters - There is a chronic shortage of NHS Dentists and people are suffering health issues as a result. The NFWI calls on the Government to increase investment in the training and retention of dentists and to review the current inadequate NHS contracts in order to ensure everyone can access an NHS dentist wherever they live.

WI Members will now have the opportunity to learn more about the issue at this meeting and to discuss it further before deciding how their delegate should vote at the Annual Meeting.

- Let us remember the brave dodors and nurses who cared for the wounded, the men and women who talled in the fields, the cool mines, the factories and the air raid wordens, police officers, firemen, ombulance drivens and the young people of the Socota and Guides who all played such a vital raile in the wor.
